Maybe you will try some of our recipes and traditions with your family and create new memories and maybe these will spark you to do something different, something you have been wanting to try, a new tradition you have been wanting to create. Ingredients

- 1 pound filo dough (Keep frozen until ready to use then read how to thaw)
- 1 ½ cups melted butter
- 2 cups walnuts chopped finely (I have a small food processor that only chops and grinds that works well)
- 1 cup pistachios chopped finely
- 3 cups sugar
- 1 ½ tablespoons cinnamon
- 1 cup Orange Blossom Water
- 3 tablespoons honey
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Directions

- 1. Prepare syrup by mixing 2 cups of sugar, Orange Blossom water, honey, and lemon juice in a saucepan. Bring to a boil for 10 minutes while stirring with a small whisk or spoon. Set aside and let cool. Do NOT refrigerate.
- 2. Prepare mixture for the middle of the baklava by mixing walnuts, pistachios, cinnamon, and only ONE cup of sugar. Set mixture aside.
- 3. Take the filo dough out of the box, unwrap it, count the number of sheets. Why? Half of the sheets are below the nut mixture and the other half will go over it.
- 4. Keep the melted butter warm, brush some of it on the bottom of a 13x18 inch baking sheet, then place your first sheet of filo dough down. Brush that sheet with some melted butter, then place the second sheet down; keep doing this until half the filo dough is used. It is optional to brush that last sheet of that first half with butter. I do.
- 5. Now take the nut mixture and spread it over the filo sheets.
- 6. With the second half of the filo sheets, you will do the same as you did the first half. Please that first sheet over the nut mixture, butter it, place the second sheet and so forth.
- 7. When the last sheet is placed, you once again have the option of buttering it. I do.
- 8. Now, take a sharp non-serrated knife and cut the unbaked baklava from corner to corner. Keep doing this until the entire sheet is cut in one direction, then start cutting in the other direction. What you are doing is creating diamond shapes. How large or small you want them to be is up to you.



9. Bake in a convection oven for 45 minutes at 350 degree. If your oven is NOT convection, then bake for 35 minutes on the

bottom rack and 10 minutes in the middle rack at 350 degrees. The filo dough will come out a golden brown. 10. Now let the baklava cool for at least an hour.

11. Take the syrup mixture and spoon it over the cooled baklava. You will use the entire syrup mixture. If you spoon the mixture over the hot baklava, it will come out a soupy mess!

Cover with foil but for the foil not to stick to the top layer place toothpicks standing up in various locations in the cuts. Now place the baklava in the refrigerator overnight. This will give time for the syrup to saturate the pastry.
To serve, I place pieces in cupcake holders.

Homemade Egg Bread

My family enjoys warm, fresh egg bread for the holidays and the wonderful smell fills your house!

TOTAL TIME: Prep time 30 min + rising YIELD: 2 Loaves (16 slices each)

Ingredients:

2 packages (1/4 ounce each) active dry yeast 1/2 cup warm water (110 ° to 115°) 1—1/2 cups warm whole milk (110° to 115°) 3 large eggs , room temperature 1/4 cup butter, softened 1/4 cup sugar 1 Tablespoon salt 7 to 7 1/2 cups all-purpose flour 1 large egg yolk, room temperature 2 tablespoons water Sesame seeds



Directions:

1. In a large bowl, dissolve yeast in warm water. Add milk, eggs, butter, sugar, salt and 3 cups flour; beat on medium speed until smooth. Stir in enough remaining flour to form a soft dough.

2. Turn dough onto a floured surface; knead until smooth and elastic, 6-8 minutes (I use our KitchenAid dough hook to do this for me! Knead until the dough forms into a ball and does not stick to the bowl--you may need to add tiny bits of liquid or flour). Place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease the top. Cover and let rise in a warm place until doubled, 1-1/2 to 2 hours.

3. Punch down dough. Turn onto a lightly floured surface; divide into 6 portions. Roll each portion into a 14-in. rope. For each loaf, braid 3 ropes together on a greased baking sheet; pinch ends to seal and tuck under. Cover with kitchen towels; let rise in a warm place until doubled, about 50 minutes. Preheat the oven to 375°.

4. Beat together egg yolk and water; brush over loaves. Sprinkle with sesame seeds. Bake until golden brown, 30-35 minutes. Remove from pans to wire racks to cool.

Chapter Updates: Orange Coast College—Beta Mu Alpha



Although the COVID-19 restrictions of 2020 significantly altered the course of our journey to five-star certification, our chapter is projected to successfully reach the destination. Our expedition began with HIA preparations last March wherein we created an action committee for the project and began reviewing the scientific literature on several topics such as energy and sports drinks, war, the developmental effects of pornography, and e-cigarettes. In April, our former officers conducted a thorough election to truly kickstart Beta Mu Alpha's pursuit of Five-Star Status in the 2020-2021 school year. Shortly thereafter we set a plan to achieve 5-Star Status and began reviewing the scientific literature on several different topics for HIA. In the following months, we sent recruitment emails to potential members and recorded a beautiful recruitment video. Additionally, we achieved Three-Star Status by coordinating with NV/CA regional officers to carry out the Fall Semester Kickoff Event and finalized our HIA topic: Theme Four with specifications on vaccines. At the outset of the Fall semester, we began holding chapter meetings, created a bylaw review committee, reached out to our School's President to begin our College Project, and started networking with prominent epidemiologists for our HIA event. In October, we held our HIA event on the efficacy of vaccines along with the mechanisms whereby they function. This event garnered 100+ participants and featured speeches and interviews from professors of USC, UCI, and OCC. Furthermore, in November, we coordinated with HOAG hospital to write thank you messages to healthcare workers. We are currently writing Hallmark Award nominations, and our College Project event—which will take the form of a presentation on how to succeed in college for the 500 students currently living on campus at OCC—is set to take place on January 6th.
